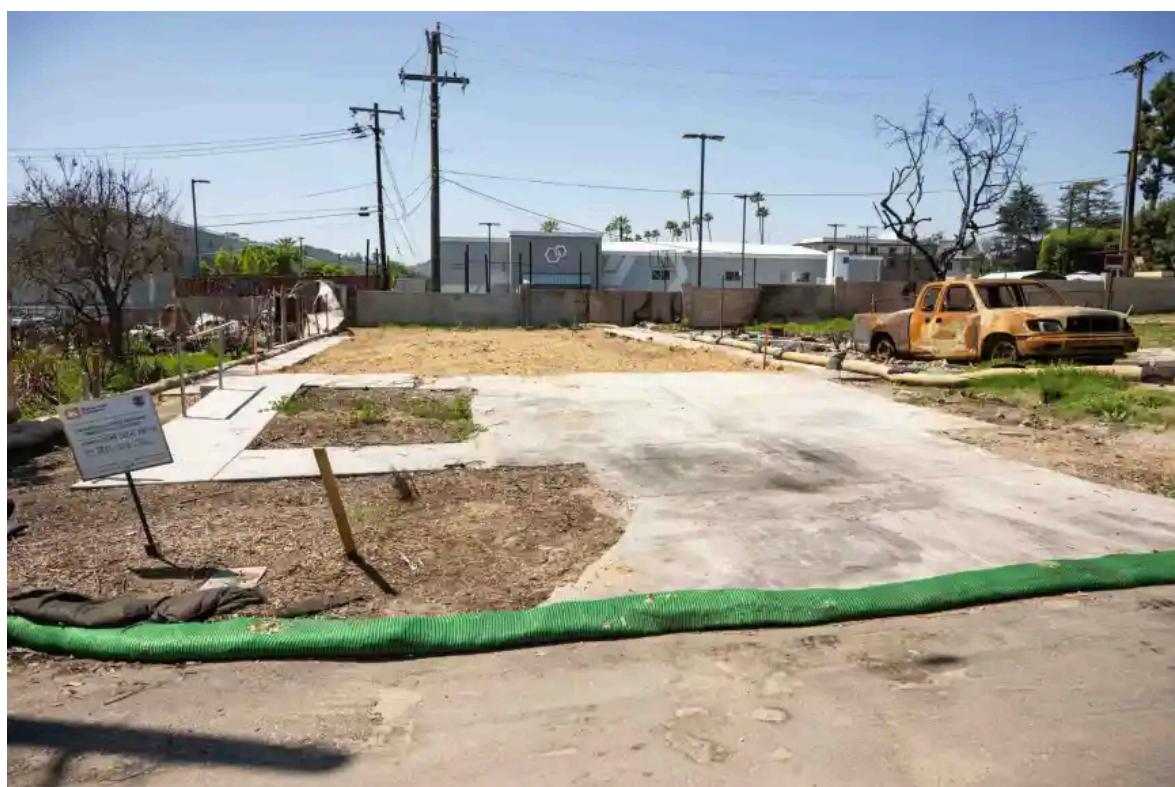


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A post Eaton-fire milestone: First property in Altadena fire zone gets a permit for rebuilding

The nonprofit Habitat for Humanity built the original home that burned down in the fire and submitted like-for-like plans for new home

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It is a narrow lot in West Altadena, cleared of debris from a modest house that burned down in the [Eaton fire](#) and is now tagged ready for new construction.

The lot, at 2399 North Olive Ave., is the first property to receive permit approval for rebuilding by Los Angeles County authorities among the nearly 7,000 homes destroyed in the devastating fire, the county and other sources confirmed on Wednesday, April 9.

“It is the very first permit-ready property,” said Faith Mellinger, a spokesperson for the San Gabriel Valley Chapter of Habitat for Humanity. “It is a milestone.”

The three-bedroom, 1,100-square-foot house, was originally built with the help of Habitat for Humanity and sold at a reduced mortgage to a family who lived there since November 2023 until the Jan. 7 – Jan. 8 fire destroyed the home, Mellinger said.

“It is very exciting,” she said. “It is a testament to what Habitat for Humanity can do for other members of the community as well.”

The nonprofit resubmitted the old plans for the rebuild to the county at the [One-Stop Permitting Center](#) in Altadena, making it easier for approval since there were no changes, Mellinger said.

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"This particular property was recently built on, so the initial building plans were easy to access," Mellinger said. "It is a like-for-like approval process."

Habitat for Humanity was issued the permit by the county on Wednesday afternoon, Mellinger confirmed.

The county's pace in issuing permits in the Altadena burn zone drew L.A. County Supervisor Kathryn [Barger's ire on Tuesday](#).

The Board of Supervisors in early March brought a permitting team to Altadena, creating the One-Stop Recovery Permitting Center in an empty building at 464 W. Woodbury Road, Suite 210, in Altadena.

The goal for weeks, voiced by Barger and others, was to cut the red tape to get people building back again, and quickly.

But even with the one-stop shop humming along, the bureaucracy was still winning. By Tuesday morning, no rebuild permits had been issued in Altadena, three months to date after the fire, reported Barger, whose district includes Altadena.

Barger called the situation "unacceptable," adding the deliberate activity was spoiling the dreams of Altadena residents wanting to rebuild their homes.

"I've been keeping a close eye on the county's one-stop permitting shop and to be candid — I'm not satisfied with the pace," Barger said Tuesday.

In September 2023, Barger joined SGV Habitat and local leaders to celebrate the home — a lifelong dream for the family of five — on Olive Avenue. The family was the 100th family served by the nonprofit, as part of its "Expanding the American Dream" campaign.

It was touted as a milestone moment in a region where some estimates showed that yearly salary needed to buy a median priced home and comfortably make mortgage payments hovered around \$220,000 in L.A. County.

"The newly issued permit marks another important step towards Altadena's recovery," said Barger in an emailed response on Wednesday. "Hope and stability go hand in hand — and we need to keep accelerating this permitting work to the extent possible."

The county confirmed the permit was issued, said Lisette Guzman, a spokesperson from the county Public Works.

But in the wake of the fire, the lot is surrounded by homes that were destroyed in an Altadena where concern is in the air about developers landbanking in the area — buying up burned parcels for future sales or developing.

The lot directly to the north still has debris and several burned out vehicles on the property. The neighborhood is just east of Lincoln Avenue and south of Figueroa Avenue, where some homes were destroyed but many homes and apartments were intact.

SGV Habitat for Humanity is working on helping 200 other households whose homes were completely destroyed, damaged or just needing repairs, Mellinger said.

“Some people just lost garages. Others want to build an ADU (Accessory Dwelling Unit built on a single-family lot),” she said. The group targets those in the Eaton fires who are underinsured and need help with figuring out permits and with finances to rebuild.

“We are looking to help 200 households, to help those most vulnerable,” Mellinger said.

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
